- Respect all players, coaches, umpires, administrators and spectators, and teach young people to do the same.
- Applaud good performances and efforts from all individuals and teams. Congratulate all participants on their performance, regardless of the game's outcome.
- Do not engage in physical and/or verbal intimidation, abuse or conduct toward any player, official, umpire or supporter.
- Recognise and respect that all volunteers give up their time to support your club.
- Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every person regardless of their gender, ability, cultural background or religion.
- Respect the facilities and equipment of your own and opposing clubs.
- Condemn the use of violence in any form, whether it is by spectators, coaches, officials or players.
- Abusive and obscene language is unacceptable.

NO PERSON(S) ATTENDING A MATCH, FUNCTION OR EVENT SHALL:

- Bring alcohol into a venue without prior consent from the Club and/or relevant licensed authorities.
- Take alcohol or glass bottles onto the playing surface
- Enter the Field of Play during the course of a match, except for 1/4, 1/2 and 3/4 time breaks.

MATCH PREVIEW

Two Q AFL Colts sides filled with talent come together today to decide who will take home the Premiership Cup.

The Western Magpies, who topped the table at the end of the home and away season look like the most likely side to raise the trophy today at Leyshon Park, after setting themselves as the benchmark of the competition.

The Magpies came agonisingly close to taking out the title one season ago but fell short against a rampant Morningside side. A chance at redemption now presents itself for the Magpies.

The Magpies have dropped just three games all year including one to Saturday's opposition; Palm Beach Currumbin, but boast a side brimming with talent and genuine match winners.

Led by duo Deng Arok and Samson Ryan, the side from Brisbane's western suburbs have been one of the competition's most lethal sides on the scoreboard, with the pair playing a significant role in their success this season. Both Arok and Ryan finished in the top five for the Keith Wallis Medal for the Colts' Best and Fairest player.

Palm Beach Currumbin, who will field sides in all three of Saturday's fixtures, will look to test their winning culture against the Magpies in a true David v Goliath battle.

The Lions did chalk up a win against the Magpies earlier this season but will be forced to overcome their loss a fortnight ago to the same side.

Despite both sides recording the same amount of scoring opportunities in their most recent encounter, the Magpies dominated general play in the wet and miserable conditions. With better conditions this time around, the opportunity arises for the Lions to rewrite their loss in the biggest game of the season.

A key for the Lions will be youngster Aidan McCabe who was instrumental in the side's Preliminary Final win over Wilston Grange last Saturday and Ari Miles, who has been among the side's most consistent players this season.

Either way, the Q AFL Colts Grand Final poises to crown a new champion in 2018. Both sides will need a contribution across the board if they are to take out the ultimate prize.

GROGAN MEDAL

BROADBEACH'S COMMUNITY VIBE WAS THE MAIN DRIVING FACTOR IN BLAKE ERICKSON'S MOVE TO THE CATS AHEAD OF THE 2018 SEASON - A DECISION WHICH HAS ALREADY REAPED PLENTY OF REWARDS FOR BOTH CLUB AND PLAYER THIS SEASON.

Erickson topped his QAFL contemporaries at the 73rd annual J.A Grogan Medal on Sunday night, joining an illustrious fraternity of previous winners in just his first full season with the Cats.

He polled 20 votes to sit outright atop the competition leaderboard ahead of Palm Beach Currumbin's Jason Burge on 18 votes (ineligible) and Surfers Paradise's Brody Haberfield (14) in third.

His stellar debut season in the blue and white came as a result of his genuine football talent and a strong work ethic and dedication to rehab that truly set him apart from his peers.

A strong two-way runner, Erickson shone for the Cats as they produced a top two finish for the first time in 12 seasons and claimed a Grand Final berth for the first time since 1996.

MATCH PREVIEW

The Broadbeach Cats have continued to prove the significant depth they have at the club for most of the season. After all, they qualified for finals in all three grades, although their colts were bundled out at the Preliminary Final stage last weekend. However, both their Reserves and Seniors have both made it here to Grand Final day.

The Cats have suffered a horrid run of injury in their QAFL Senior side in recent weeks and the mounting injury ward will undoubtedly take a toll on the Reserve stocks. Ryan Pantic and Shawn Watson have both been pivotal for the Cats' Senior side this season. Both will be absent for the Grand Final, sending down reverberations which could affect the Reserve grade's chance of lifting the silverware.

Palm Beach Currumbin will fare far better on the injury front and the side will be boosted by the likely inclusion of Southport NEAFL product Seb Rogers, who injects a wealth of speed and smoothness around the contest.

The Cats too will reap the benefits of a big NEAFL inclusion to the side, with Redland utility Harrison Kerr set to suit up for the side for what will be the fourth time this season.

Broadbeach took the Reserves Minor Premiership after only two losses and they firmed as favourites for the flag when second-placed Mt Gravatt were knocked out in straight sets. In Broadbeach's favour is that they boast the top two goalkickers in Tayler Rolfe (51) and Dan Seri (40).

Palm Beach Currumbin's best was former soccer player Riley Dillon with 21 goals to his name.

The Cats hold bragging rights in matches between the two sides this year.

BROADBEACH MATCH PREVIEW

Broadbeach produced their best season in Queensland football since 2006 – the last time the Cats finished top two in their competition.

Their Grand Final berth heralds a milestone of its own given it's been a long time between drinks for the Gold Coast club. You'd need to date back to 1996 for the last time Broadbeach made an appearance in a Grand Final; the same time current head coach Brett Andrews was skipper of the side.

But after a highly successful season on the field, the Cats will embark on a new chapter in club history when the side runs out this afternoon against Palm Beach Currumbin.

The Cats booked the ticket with a comfortable win over Morningside at Subaru Oval that was characteristic of many of their performances this season thus far.

Broadbeach generate most of their drive through the midfield where a star-studded cast thrive in both contested and uncontested situations.

Their midfield prowess is perhaps their biggest strength and could hold the key in the Grand Final, especially against the Lions' plethora of two-way runners through the midfield.

Fresh off his Grogan Medal crowning last Sunday night, Blake Erickson has emerged in just one season as one of the competition's best players. Erickson thrives on the outside of the contest and his ability to float forward and hit the scoreboard makes him the Cats' most damaging prospect in the midfield.

He joins the experience of Evan Panozza and Nicholas Kempe in a midfield also boosted by the X-factor of Kwaby Boakye over the past number of weeks.

Down forward, all channels flow through Matt Fowler, who established himself as perhaps the most dynamic key forward in the QAFL this season.

While not the tallest of targets inside 50, Fowler boasts a near unbeatable contested mark and has a track record better than all his contemporaries this season after etching his name into the history books with a League best 57 goals.

Fowler isn't the only Cat who has developed a knack for finding the big sticks either, with Nicholas Burton also happy to chime in on the scoreboard.

Premierships for the Cats have been hard to come since their formation in 1971 with the club managing just two; one in 1987 and another in 1996. And while they may appear genuine underdogs ahead of the big dance; especially since the club are yet to beat Palm Beach Currumbin this season, the Cats' have enjoyed their best season in QAFL history and would love nothing more than to finish it with one more win.

PALM BEACH CURRUMBIN MATCH PREVIEW

The 2018 season has been another gallant success for a tough Palm Beach Currumbin side, who again find themselves on the verge of history before the 2018 QAFL Grand Final.

The Lions of course, claimed the Premiership one season ago in a dominant upset against Labrador, and the Gold Coast club now have the opportunity to make it back to back titles.

Palm Beach Currumbin, under the tutelage of Chad Owens, have again been the benchmark of the competition and enter the Grand Final as the heavy favourite – a moniker that didn't help the Tigers last season.

Owens' men have dropped just two games this season – the first against Morningside and again against Surfers Paradise.

Despite their losses, the Lions have been the preeminent team of the competition and enter the Grand Final contest in a rich vein of form – especially when it comes to their opposition today.

Palm Beach Currumbin have beaten the Cats on all three occasions this season and keeping their

opponents well at bay in their Semi Final showdown a fortnight ago.

What makes the Lions stand out against the crowd is their number of quality players across the park.

Jason Burge, Thomas Thynne and Nicholas Crowley are all stars of the competition in their own right, but with all three operating within the same midfield, the odds are stacked heavily in the Lions' favour.

The speed of rising star youngster Caleb Graham on the outside has been a revelation for the Lions in the second half of the season and the ability of Graham to find space and have an impact against Broadbeach could well be the difference between the two sides.

John Anthony and Jarryd Douglas wreak havoc for the Lions inside 50 and have become the biggest beneficiary of their side's midfield dominance this season. The pair have kicked an unprecedented 96 goals between them this year – the most of any two teammates throughout the QAFL.

If Palm Beach Currumbin's midfielders can will themselves on top at the coal face, it's likely the pair could be in for a big afternoon.

This Grand Final could well define the legacy of the current Palm Beach Currumbin side. A second consecutive trophy could secure Palm Beach Currumbin a place in the history books as one of the most successful teams in QAFL history.
